Dear Friends,

Without question, the year 2010 saw significant progress in our fight against AIDS.

In July, President Obama unveiled the nation's first-ever National AIDS Strategy—a comprehensive, coordinated plan with measurable goals and objectives to fight the epidemic across the U.S. In November, news broke of the results of iPrEx, a promising study that showed up to 90 percent efficacy in blocking infection

among HIV-negative men who took a drug traditionally used to treat HIV infection. And trials continued in our long-term efforts to finally develop an HIV vaccine—our only hope of truly ending the epidemic completely.

This was a year fraught with significant setbacks, too. New studies confirmed our fears—that HIV continues to ravage gay men and particularly gay men of color. Data show that, on average, one in five gay men is now living with HIV, and they are an astonishing 44 times more likely to contract the disease than their heterosexual counterparts. And, for the second year in a row, the state of California refused to restore critical HIV/AIDS funding that the governor eliminated in 2009. For the third year running, California's HIV prevention budget remains at \$0.

Tragically, the hardest hit this year were APLA's clients, who struggled to find or keep jobs, stay healthy, and meet even their most basic needs. The lines at our food pantries grew; our dental clinic was booked weeks in advance; and more clients than ever streamed through our Residential Services program, desperate

for safe, stable housing. Increasingly, our clients struggled with HIV alongside crushing poverty, homelessness, hunger, addiction, and myriad other obstacles.

As the epidemic changes and grows, so do we. We have launched new HIV prevention initiatives for gay men of color (among those at greatest risk of HIV infection); expanded our direct services for a client population that now exceeds 10,000; and further cemented our commitment to South Los Angeles with new programs—and even a new site—to bring care to this vastly under-resourced region.

The government's message is clear: Don't rely on us to sustain your work. That's why you, our valued donors, are our greatest asset. Without your steadfast support, we would simply be unable to meet our community's most urgent needs.

Together, we can continue to meet the challenges of a world still devastated by the epidemic. And together, we will work toward a future where AIDS is only a distant, painful memory.

F R E D D I E & J E R R Y

It had come to this: Freddie Goss, a severe diabetic living with AIDS, had slumped over in his chair, speechless. His partner and caregiver, Jerry Marshall, knew that an immediate injection of Glucagon, a drug used to raise dangerously low blood sugar, was the only thing that would save Freddie's life. But, in this moment of sheer panic, Jerry was frozen.

From the moment they had met, Jerry Marshall and Freddie Goss shared nearly everything: A love of dancing; a passion for writing; an intense involvement in civil rights efforts; and eventually, a raging addiction to crystal meth and alcohol.

It was the addiction that eventually caused their split, after 18 years. Freddie decided to get sober; Jerry didn't.

"I told him, 'You go ahead and stop, Freddie,'" Jerry recounts, "but I'm going to do [crystal] for the rest of my life."

In fact, he continued to use crystal daily until he was arrested. "The thought of spending time in prison—not jail, but prison—was horrifying to me," Jerry says. "It was enough to scare me into sobriety."

So Jerry took himself to an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting, determined to stay clean. It was there, across the room, that Jerry saw Freddie for the first time since their split. But Freddie was different; he was on crutches, gaunt, and he greeted Jerry with slurred speech.

"I knew right away that something was wrong," Jerry explains. In fact, something was very wrong: Freddie was living with AIDS and diabetes, and he'd suffered a stroke. His blood sugar would drop without warning—once so suddenly that he had no chance to pull over the car he was driving. He swerved and crashed into a tree.

"I held his hand and said, 'You can let go, Freddie. It's okay. Dina, our APLA social worker, was by my side. I can't imagine going through it alone.'"

"When we saw each other at that meeting, it was like we were never apart," Jerry says. "The minute I saw him like this, I knew that I had to help."

Within two weeks, Jerry had moved back in with Freddie—and he'd signed Freddie up to receive services from APLA's Home Health Program.

"An APLA nurse and social worker came to the house regularly," Jerry recalls, "and they helped us work through every obstacle we encountered."

When food ran low, Dina, their social worker, signed Freddie up for an APLA food pantry. When money was tight, an APLA Benefits Counselor, Vicky, helped them through a labyrinth of forms to get disability payments. And when Freddie suddenly went in to diabetic crisis—with Jerry frozen by his side—an APLA nurse, Jeannie, walked Jerry step-by-step through the process of administering the Glucagon shot himself.

"She didn't just do it for me," Jerry says. "She showed me how to stay calm and do it for myself. In that way, she gave me the confidence I needed to save Freddie's life."

But as Freddie's health continued to decline, his APLA social worker arranged for in-home counseling from a licensed therapist (free of charge) to help them both with the grieving process.

And it was Dina, their APLA social worker, who was one of the last to see Freddie alive.

"I held his hand and said, 'You can let go, Freddie. It's okay,'" Jerry recalls. "Dina was by my side. I can't imagine going through it alone."

Freddie looked toward the ceiling and took his final breath.

"APLA was there every step of the way," Jerry says, "from making sure he lived well to allowing him to die with dignity."

"I couldn't imagine caring for him by myself," Jerry adds. "From the moment I moved in, Freddie had a caring family with me and APLA together." **APLA**

THE GREEN FAMILY

In the two weeks since Jackie Green had learned that she had AIDS, her life had been a blur. It began with the call from her doctor, who said, “Hi, Jackie” and then “Are you sitting down?”

It was yet another devastating blow for the mother of four. She had already fought cancer in 1998 and then Hodgkin’s Lymphoma in 2000.

“Not again,” Jackie remembers saying. “I’d already had two brushes with death. And now this.”

Just days after the diagnosis, she was sitting in her living room, home alone and crying, when the phone rang again.

“Jackie, it’s your doctor again,” the caller said.

“What now?” Jackie asked, frozen in place.

“It’s your husband,” the doctor replied. “He’s positive, too.” Jackie exhaled sharply, gut-punched.

“And your daughter,” the doctor continued. “Her, too.” Jackie crumpled to the floor.

Jackie Green still remembers his order: a Quarter Pounder with cheese, large fries, and a Coke. She took the same order nearly every day from her perch behind the register at the McDonald’s where she worked. But one day, Kelly, the regular customer who always seemed to choose her line, added a surprise request to his order: “...a Coke, and your phone number,” he said, smiling.

He was “Heaven sent,” Jackie recalls, and their connection was immediate. She had two sons from a previous marriage; he had one daughter. It was like an instant family, says Jackie, who has no living relatives herself.

“APLA’s food pantry literally saved our lives... Now we’re more hopeful than ever, thanks to APLA.”

They had family dinners and date nights, and their respective children connected quickly among each other. Soon, Jackie was pregnant with a daughter—her first child with Kelly. They were ecstatic. But hard times were ahead.

Soon after birth, their daughter was diagnosed with severe developmental delays. Doctors predicted that she would never surpass the functioning of an 11-year-old.

Then Jackie was diagnosed with cancer—twice. The first time, she defeated it soundly; but the second time was rougher.

“My doctors and I knew that the chemo was suppressing my immune system,” she recalls. “But what we didn’t know is that HIV was, too.” The combination of the two nearly killed her.

But it wasn’t until 2000 that Jackie learned of her HIV diagnosis, when she went to the doctor for a painful ulcer. In fact, she already had full-blown AIDS.

And two weeks later, she learned that her husband, along with their young daughter, were both infected, as well.

A slew of other problems followed: Jackie became deeply depressed and anxious. She developed painful neuropathy in her face, along with high blood pressure, high cholesterol, type 2 diabetes, and breathing problems. HIV complications forced her and Kelly to stop working, and their daughter’s disability, compounded with her own HIV, prevented her from working, too.

“That’s when things really got bad,” Jackie says. Living on Kelly’s Social Security checks, the money ran out after rent and utilities. There was rarely food, and the family teetered on homelessness.

“That’s when I found APLA,” Jackie says. She signed up for the agency’s Necessities of Life Program (NOLP) food pantry. Her husband and daughter qualified and registered, too.

“It literally saved our lives,” she says.

Soon, the family was shopping weekly for fish, chicken, fresh vegetables, and more. Kelly, whose weight had plummeted since his diagnosis, picked up Ensure nutritional supplements, along with peanuts, brownies, and other snacks. They met with APLA’s dietitian and were armed with recipes and tips to make the most of their weekly APLA groceries.

APLA’s Residential Services counselors stepped in, too, shepherding Jackie through the process to apply for affordable housing. With APLA’s help, she’s been able to work with her current landlord to reduce the rent on the family’s small home without having to move—a hardship that would have overwhelmed the weakened couple.

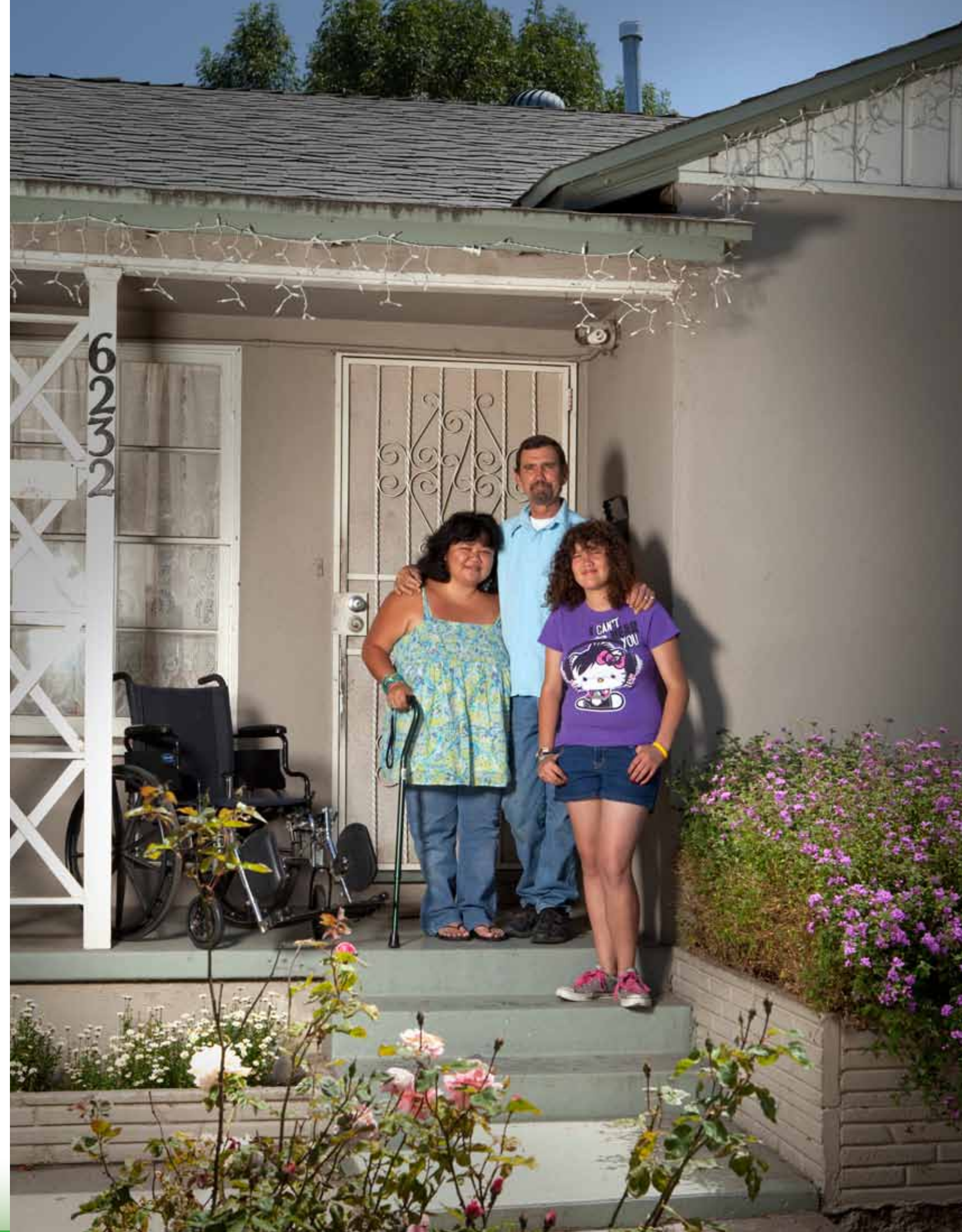
Asked where she’d be if APLA hadn’t provided support, she shutters: “I don’t even want to think about that.”

Hard times and open questions remain—like who gave HIV to whom (“We’ll never know,” Jackie says, “so we’ve forgiven each other and moved on”). And recent medical complications have forced her to temporarily cease HIV treatment. An oxygen mask lies next to her, a testament to her recent bouts of AIDS-related complications.

“But we’re more hopeful than ever, thanks to APLA,” she says, gently stroking a newborn puppy sitting next to her on the living room couch.

“We’ve even started breeding our dogs,” she says, smiling, “because now I think I’ll be around long enough to watch them grow.” **APLA**

As a child, 26-year-old "Linda" (who prefers to use a pseudonym) was virtually inseparable from her mother. They did everything together—shopping, eating, watching films, and even sharing the same doctor, whom they saw frequently. At first, Linda says, the monthly appointments seemed normal.

"I assumed my mom just wanted to keep me healthy," she explains. But Linda's younger sister became suspicious.

"She asked my mom incessantly why I had to see the doctor so often," Linda says, "and Mom finally broke down and told her." Both Linda and her mother were HIV-positive.

"She swore my sister to secrecy," Linda recalls, "but that lasted for about two minutes." Linda was seven when her sister broke the news, and it devastated her.

"I was sad, upset, confused, everything you can imagine," Linda says. She had questions, too: Was her father also sick? But she couldn't ask him; he was serving a life sentence in Attica penitentiary in New York for murder.

"My APLA case manager really invested in me. It wasn't just, 'Here's some money and good luck.' He sat me down and said, 'Let's make a plan together so that this never happens again.'"

In the years that followed, Linda would undergo an odyssey of doctor appointments and treatments as she also struggled with normal adolescent pressures of school, dating, and friendships. She attended funerals, too: "It boggles me that some of my friends still have never been to a funeral. I've lost count of how many I've attended."

"This idea that people weren't dying of AIDS in the 90s and 2000s—that's a complete myth," she explains.

When she hit her 20s, she sought a job—"I never thought I'd see age 20, let alone be healthy enough to work," she says gratefully. But then, the economy collapsed and so did her life. "I lost my job," Linda says, "and I was in an abusive relationship, so I had to get out."

Linda moved into a small apartment. But with a weekly income of just \$57 in unemployment benefits, the electricity bill went unpaid, and the lights went out. So did the gas. And then the water. For days, she sat in her darkened apartment, her food slowly spoiling inside a warm refrigerator.

"Something had to give," she says. Poor, hungry, and desperate, Linda arrived at APLA. "Right away, everything changed," she explains. "A case manager sorted through my bills, and within days, he had given me a check from the client assistance fund to get the power and water back on."

But it didn't end there: "My case manager really invested in me," she says. "It wasn't just, 'Here's some money and good luck.' He sat me down and said, 'Let's make a plan together so that this never happens again.'" He walked her down to an APLA food pantry to restock her fridge; made her an appointment at APLA's dental clinic to have six painful cavities filled; and referred her to an APLA Residential Services specialist, who helped her find stable housing, so she wouldn't have to return to her abusive past.

"Every time things have gotten tough, APLA's been there with long-term solutions," she says. "And they don't just do the work for me," she adds. "They empower me to do it for myself." In 2008, Linda even traveled to Washington, D.C. with APLA staff to testify before Congress in support of AIDS funding.

This fall, Linda will return to school to pursue training in cosmetology or psychology.

"My mom says I'm going to make it," Linda says. "And now I think she's right." **APLA**

2010 Highlights

Leadership in prevention, advocacy, and service.

The year 2010 marked the 29th of the AIDS epidemic—and the 27th for APLA. In 1983, we began as one of the first AIDS organizations, answering calls from a panicked public. Today, we continue as a leader in the fight to end AIDS. Here's a sample of our past year's highlights and new initiatives.

SERVICE

In 2010, APLA offered life-sustaining services—like free food, dental care, housing assistance, and more—to over 9,600 clients.

NEW SITE OPENS IN WEST HOLLYWOOD In November, APLA reinforced its commitment to West Hollywood residents affected by HIV/AIDS with the opening of its newest site—a storefront space in the city's just-opened Sierra Bonita Apartments. APLA uses the space to offer mental health services, HIV prevention groups, and even a yoga class to boost wellness among people who are HIV-positive.

AGENCY FIGHTS TOBACCO USE AMONG PEOPLE LIVING WITH HIV Throughout the year, APLA undertook an ambitious effort to cut tobacco use among people living with HIV/AIDS, with support from the California Department of Public Health. Our work began at our own facilities—whose outdoor areas became smoke-free—and continued countywide with *Quit It*, a tobacco cessation toolkit we created for, and distributed to, HIV/AIDS community groups nationwide.

HOME HEALTH PROGRAM TURNS 20 This year marked the 20th anniversary for APLA's Home Health Program, launched in 1990 to provide in-home, palliative care as an alternative to institutionalization for those losing their battles with AIDS. The program's nurses and licensed social workers now coordinate a full range of care for homebound clients, including transportation to doctor appointments, in-home therapy, and help with basic needs, like bathing and grocery shopping.

APLA RAISES VACCINE AWARENESS Throughout the year, APLA continued work to promote the importance of, and recruit for, HIV vaccine trials—because finding a safe, effective, and affordable vaccine to prevent the spread of HIV is our

best long-term hope for controlling the epidemic. Beginning in 2009, APLA has offered a series of community presentations on HIV vaccine research and trials, as well as training for primary care physicians. APLA has also integrated vaccine messaging and information into the curriculum for our quarterly HIV treatment education trainings for healthcare providers. The initiative is funded by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and is a collaboration with AIDS Research Alliance. APLA's education efforts also seek to dispel myths about participation in vaccine trials (such as the notion that vaccine research volunteers can actually contract HIV from potential vaccines; this is absolutely false.).

PREVENTION

Throughout 2010, APLA continued its intensive and focused HIV prevention efforts targeting those at highest risk of infection amid data confirming that Los Angeles sees on average eight new infections per day—one every three hours.

NEW PREVENTION PROGRAM LAUNCHES FOR BLACK GAY MEN APLA again expanded its services for gay men of color with the launch of "Many Men, Many Voices," a series of interactive workshops focused on HIV prevention. Expert facilitators guide spirited discussion among participants on safer sex, drug use, relationships, racism, homophobia, and more. The six-week program helps participants improve self-image, based on evidence linking higher self-esteem with healthier life choices. All participants are also tested for HIV and immediately linked to medical care if they are positive.



WAR DIARIES HITS SHELVES

Making its debut at the 2010 International AIDS Conference in Vienna, *War Diaries* is a new collection of words and

images that highlights the impact of HIV and AIDS among gay men of color, featuring perspectives from LGBT members of the African Diaspora. The collection, which represents a collaboration between APLA and The Global Forum on MSM and HIV (MSMGF), features poetry, memoir, critical essays, and original artwork from some of today's most vibrant voices.

APLA FOCUSES ON YOUTH HIV PREVENTION The agency re-launched its Mpowerment program, an HIV prevention initiative focused on young men ages 18 to 24. Youth comprise a significant number of HIV infections nationwide. Mpowerment members meet twice weekly to discuss topics ranging from safer sex to healthy cooking—all aimed at boosting wellness and lowering HIV infection risk. Group members also conduct peer outreach at local nightclubs to talk about HIV risk and promote Mpowerment. For youth who are more comfortable in one-on-one settings, APLA offers RESPECT, an individual session with a trained APLA counselor to discuss strategies for staying safe. All RESPECT participants are also offered a free HIV test, along with pre- and post-test counseling.

APLA RESPONDS TO BIOMEDICAL BREAKTHROUGH In a public statement, the agency hailed a report in November that showed significant promise for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) as a viable HIV prevention strategy. In PrEP, HIV-negative individuals are put on a regimen of drugs normally used to treat HIV/AIDS; researchers found that one such effort was up to 90 percent effective in those who took the regimen exactly as prescribed. Our optimism is measured, however, as accessibility and adherence issues remain ongoing challenges.

RED CIRCLE PROJECT LEADER RECEIVES COMMUNITY RECOGNITION Red Circle Project Program Coordinator Elton Naswood was selected as an award recipient of the 2010 American Indian Heritage Month Local Leadership Awards by KCET-TV and the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians. The Red Circle Project offers culturally competent HIV prevention education for Native Americans / Alaska Natives, who comprise a significant segment of the Los Angeles community and have the third-highest rate of HIV infection, behind only African Americans and Latinos. The award recognizes the accomplishments of Native Americans/Alaska Natives who make significant contributions to their community.

ADVOCACY

APLA CLIENTS HEAD TO CONGRESS In April, APLA clients joined staff at the U.S. Capitol for AIDSWatch 2010, the nation's largest federal HIV/AIDS advocacy events. As part of a Southern California delegation, our clients met with members of Congress and their staffers to tell their personal stories and put a face to the epidemic. APLA staff met with key decision makers to seek a renewed federal commitment to HIV/AIDS prevention and care programs and to discuss implementation of health care reform and the roll out of the new National HIV/AIDS Strategy.

AGENCY FIGHTS FOR RESTORATION OF STATE PREVENTION, CARE FUNDING Fallout has continued from the ongoing state budget crisis, which triggered a devastating \$85 million cut to California's HIV care and prevention programs in 2008. APLA continued its work to fight for the restoration of this key funding, which provided in-home care for those who were losing their battle with AIDS along with critical prevention and training programs to lower statewide HIV infection rates. California's state HIV prevention budget remained at \$0.

INTERNATIONAL AIDS GROUP OPENS OFFICE IN OAKLAND In early February, The Global Forum on MSM & HIV (The MSMGF) opened its headquarters in Oakland. The group, which receives fiscal and administrative support from APLA, is the only advocacy organization focused specifically on the global HIV epidemic among men who have sex with men (MSM). In July, The MSMGF held "Be Heard," a pre-conference to the 2010 International AIDS Conference, to address soaring global rates of HIV among MSM.



Programs and Services

Leadership in prevention, advocacy, and service.



CLIENT SERVICES

Antelope Valley Hope Services

a program of APLA, is that region's only provider of dental care, free groceries, case management services, and treatment education for people living with HIV/AIDS, as well as HIV prevention services.

Benefits & Work Services counselors offer expertise on HIV-related benefits and insurance issues to help clients maximize their public benefits options or return to the workforce without sacrificing health care coverage.

Case Management Services

(including Deaf Services) provides individualized support and guidance to help people living with HIV/AIDS identify and access the services they need to live an independent and productive life. APLA case managers connect people living with HIV/AIDS to Los Angeles County's medical, mental health, and social service systems. Services are also available for the deaf and hard of hearing.

Clientline is a hotline for clients and other service providers that offers information about and referrals to HIV/AIDS programs and services in the region, as well as answers to general questions about HIV/AIDS.

APLA Dental Services offers a full range of dental care from professional staff in two, state-of-the-art clinics and through a mobile dental van that provides care throughout underserved regions of Los Angeles County.

HIV L.A./VIH L.A. is a one-stop, bilingual print and online guide to HIV/AIDS services—from HIV testing to support groups to spiritual resources—throughout Los Angeles County.

HIV Matters, APLA's long-running series of community forums, brings together local experts to discuss the latest updates in HIV/AIDS prevention, care, and treatment from around the globe.

The Home Health Program provides medical and social work case management, as well as supportive services like in-home counseling and transportation to medical appointments, to help APLA's most fragile clients remain independent for as long as possible.

Mental Health Services offers short-term individual, couples, and family counseling, addictive behaviors counseling, support groups, long-term therapy with volunteer licensed therapists, and referrals to HIV/AIDS-sensitive mental health providers.

The Necessities of Life Program (NOLP) is the largest network of free food pantries in the nation for people living with HIV/AIDS. In nine locations countywide, NOLP provides life-sustaining groceries, nutritional supplements, and personal hygiene items to clients who face desperate poverty. A registered dietitian offers nutrition classes,

cooking demonstrations, and one-on-one nutrition counseling.

Residential Services helps low-income people living with HIV/AIDS who are often homeless to find and maintain safe, affordable, and stable housing. Counselors help clients develop housing plans, apply for housing assistance, move into new housing, and learn about tenant rights and responsibilities.

Transportation arranges for clients to receive monthly bus and rail passes to ensure that they always have a ride to medical and other important appointments.

The Treatment Education Program offers information on the most up-to-date treatment options and consultations with trained treatment advocates to help people living with HIV/AIDS stay healthy. Treatment educators also offer large-scale community updates and town hall forums on the latest in HIV prevention and care news.

EDUCATION & HIV PREVENTION

The African American Gay Men's Health Initiative combats high HIV infection rates in African American gay communities through outreach, support groups, and social marketing. Its newest program, "Many Men, Many Voices," aims to build the self-image of gay men of color and reduce their HIV risk.

The Community-Based Research (CBR) unit at APLA provides culturally, linguistically, and gender-appropriate research designed to improve services to people and communities affected by HIV/AIDS. The program also serves as a resource to other organizations conducting community-based research and conducts in-house research to assess the effectiveness of APLA's own programs and services.

The Crystal Methamphetamine Program aims to reduce the risk of HIV infection among gay and bisexual men who use crystal meth through bilingual, weekly groups, forums, trainings, and workshops for users and their families, friends, and loved ones.

HIV Testing at APLA includes fast, free HIV testing, along with pre- and post-test counseling and referrals to care, at locations countywide. Testing is offered on a walk-in basis.

The Mpowerment and RESPECT Programs seek to reduce the risk of HIV infection among young gay, bisexual, and questioning youth through education, peer support, one-on-one and group support, and team-building activities.

Project TND (Toward No Drug Abuse) is a group-level intervention that seeks to reduce or eliminate substance use and HIV risk among young, gay men of color.

The Red Circle Project mobilizes a vibrant core group of Native American / Alaska Native Two-Spirit people to reduce their risk of HIV infection with group sessions, one-on-one dialogue, and community-based outreach. The Native American community is among the hardest hit by the epidemic.

The Sexual Health Xchange unites APLA with AIDS service organizations nationwide to raise public awareness about the sexual health needs of gay men and other MSM and to expand the range of sexual health education options available to gay men, especially gay men of color.

Shared Action/Shared Action HD is a capacity building assistance program of AIDS Project Los Angeles, funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The program helps community-based organizations and health departments nationwide build and refine their HIV prevention programs.

ADVOCACY

The Government Affairs Division helps shape policy at the federal, state, and local levels and educates the public, elected officials, and policymakers about the needs of people living with HIV/AIDS and the programs, policies, funding and legislation that impact their lives.

GLOBAL WORK

The Global Forum on MSM & HIV (MSMGF) is the only advocacy organization focused specifically on the global HIV epidemic among men who have sex with men (MSM). Headquartered in Oakland, California, MSMGF receives fiscal and administrative support from APLA.
